ON AUGUST 21**

A Community of Love Beyond Belief: Transforming Ourselves, Houston and the World

Exercising a larger influence in Houston and the World means we will have to invite and make room for those who want what we have but don't know we're here. Short of moving to a new location, or further building renovation, a proven way to increase capacity is to add a new service. Here are seven reasons to start a new service:

1. We are consistently at or over 80% capacity on key Sundays. Our adult membership has grown from 298 to 340; our children's program from 75 to 115. If we want to allow for continued growth, we have to increase our capacity.
2. A new service will reach the unchurched (who want what we have), will focus our church's attention on the unchurched, will help us repackage our message and will allow our members to invite their friends.
3. A new service will minister to more people. 80% of congregations that move from one worship experience to two find their overall attendance jumps by at least 10%.
4. A new service will reach new kinds of people. Worship cannot be culturally neutral. Multiple services means multiple cultures around worship.
5. A new service allows for change while retaining the familiar. Alternatively, we could: redesign our present service (we would get push back), incorporate more variety into our existing service (there would be more to dislike), add a service that offers a clear choice of styles (win-win).
6. A new service will activate inactive members. "In studying churches that have added a new service...the percentage of inactive members decreases. In the typical American church, about 40% of the membership attend a service on any given Sunday. It is not uncommon to see a new service boost the member attendance percentages from the 40% range to the 60% range."
7. A new service will help the UUA survive. Second only to starting new churches for church growth is starting new services.

In the midst of the business of this summer I get to go to Missouri to a family reunion. It’s important to people in my family. Since my grandfather died about two years ago, it’ll be one of the last times I get to see his sister, my aunt Kitten. But I’m not really hyped about it. Mostly I feel like I’m doing this as an obligation to my immediate family and my father’s siblings.

There might be a few people I know, but most of them I will have never met before. Those few I have met before I haven’t seen in at least twenty years. None of them has seen me since I fully came out of the closet. So there may be some weirdness when people ask about spouses and children. But they are blood and no one will be untoward or out of line, I am sure.

But you know what? My immediate family knows all about me. And my aunts, uncles, and cousins will be there. I haven’t seen many of them in many years either. It’ll be great to catch up with them, even the crazy ones.

I will not let anxiety cause me to sabotage a potentially liminal experience as I touch my roots, my blood. So, I’ll engage FULLY... have a wonderful time journeying with my brother’s family and my folks. Catch up and compare life notes with that next circle out, my dad’s family. I’ll even kiss and hug strangers that I may not see for another 20 years.

And I’ll make sure my aunt Kitten feels well loved and taken care of by her only clergyperson grand- nephew. I will immerse myself in the dynamic energy and love of an extended family that cares more about the fact that I belong than anything else.

Going to this family reunion is kind of like coming back to church after the summer break. Many of us go wandering far and wide (hopefully not for twenty years) and coming back together we see new people we have never met, people we know but haven’t really interacted with, and our circles of close, and deep friends.

I’ve noticed some anxiety about the changes coming to this beloved community. We will not allow anxiety to interfere with that which we sanctify by our coming together as a family of faith. We decide to engage FULLY. We hold close those inner circles of friends. We keep engaging the “immediate family” of First Church through small groups, discussions, lunch after church, etc. But we also branch out. We lovingly welcome those we know and don’t yet know. And we make sure that all loved are cared for by this their new spiritual family.

When our annual Water Communion comes, let’s immerse ourselves in the dynamic energy and love of an extended church family that cares more about the fact that each of us belongs at First Church than anything else.

SPANNING THE AGES

Our New Religious Education Program

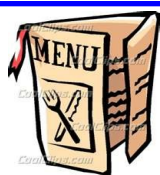
This fall we will start a new approach to Religious Education at First Church. We will get the children and youth “on the same page” with the adults by focusing on the monthly theme. The ministers and I have lined out the nine themes and the Curriculum Task Force has been busy planning for the children.

Our work involves coming up with stories that can be told to the entire church on the first Sunday of each month, stories for all ages that illustrate the theme. The stories must lend themselves to a lot of fun as well: drama, art of all kinds, field trips, and cooking will all be part of the classes that follow. For the youngest children, we will use the Spirit Play model, a Montessori approach that concretizes the story by providing three dimensional “players and pieces” for each story so that the children can tell the story themselves during the work time that follows. It is also a model that emphasizes the child’s thinking and wondering about matters spiritual-- rather than providing pat answers--and that incorporates a great deal of art activity in the response part of the class time.

The children in the Kindergarten through 5th grade will experience a curriculum approach called “the rotation model.” The story is told in church the first Sunday of the month and the children in the various grade levels move to different rooms or different stations each week to experience the story through different media.

The first week, a child might get to be the “old man” in dramatic retelling in a room that has curtains for the “show.” The next week, that child might approach the story through the eyes of a child who shows courage. She has the opportunity to use clay to create her imagining of being “that bold.” The following week the children go on a scavenger hunt to find the same things the people in the story were looking for. The idea is to have fun and learn in an environment that feels “unlike school.” And the last week, the classes all come together for worship around what they have learned. Our hope is that the fifth Sunday of the month (in October, January and April) will be dedicated to social justice or a service project that fits with the theme.

For the youth, the theme will be approached through discussion and journaling. The middle school youth will attend the service through the story time then go to class to discuss what they heard. During the following weeks, they will use a curriculum called *A Riddle and a Mystery*, which focuses on the “big questions” such as “Where do we come from?” During the last class of the month, the youth will journal about how the lessons and theme intersect in their lives. The older youth will stay in church for the entire service on the first Sunday of the month and discuss their experience afterwards. On the following Sundays they will relate the day’s lesson from *A Place of Wholeness* to the theme and journal once or twice. A similar approach will be used in the Coming of Age Class.



Everyone in their 20s and 30s is invited to join other young adults after the worship service on **Sunday, August 7**, and head out to a local restaurant for a good meal, great conversation, fun and fellowship. **Join us on Sunday, August 7**, after church when we gather in the front courtyard.

I hope that you share my excitement as we move

toward this change together and fully utilize our church each Sunday.

The board also finalized evaluations for the work that board members do collectively and individually. If you have ever wondered what the expectations are for members of the board, this gives a good picture. The documents will be posted on the website.

The Board is once again hosting listening tables before and after Sunday’s service. We would like to hear from you regarding your experience at First Church. What do you love, like or are concerned about? We keep a journal to document our conversations. You are welcome to leaf through it as you share lunch with Board members.

I am looking forward to another year of abundance for First Church. We have quality worship, adult and youth religious education, and social justice opportunities. As we enter the new fiscal year, I encourage each member to be a force for positive change in the church as we journey together down varied pathways.

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE TREASURE’S REPORT

The fiscal year ended on a disappointing note. Instead of a deficit of as little as \$7K which appeared to be in prospect as recently as the May Treasurer’s Report, we ended up with a deficit of \$21K, a shade more than the \$20K deficit originally budgeted for the year.

The chief culprit in the June shortfall was current-pledge income, which came in \$11K below budget.

Although income for the year fell short of budget by nearly \$20K, expenses were also \$18K less than budgeted, suggesting that staff was effective in its efforts to control costs. Areas in which expenses exceeded budgeted amounts included utilities (\$3K) and insurance (\$1K), which are difficult to control or reduce.

The budgeted pledge income of \$393,993 was arrived at by taking total pledges from the 2009 spring canvass (\$414,729) and discounting it 5% (i.e., on the assumption that we would actually collect 95% of the amount pledged). The actual pledge income collected over the year (\$368,293) represents only an 88.8% fulfillment rate, instead of the 95% assumed. For the current 2010-2011 year, we have again constructed the budget figure by taking 95% of pledged amounts. We will have to watch this as the year unfolds to see if using 95% is too optimistic.

A bright spot heading into the 2010-2011 year is that through the first three weeks of July, pledge income received is over \$42K, which compares favorably with the \$45,532 figure budgeted for the full month.

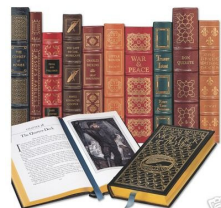

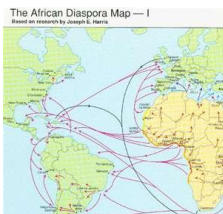

INTERWOVEN TRADITIONS: ARCHEOLOGY, SPIRITUALITY, AND THE AFRICAN DIASPORA

7:00 p.m., Wednesday, Aug. 24

Presenter: Carol McDavid, Ph.D.



Over several hundred years, millions of Africans were captured from their homelands and transported all over the world – to America, the Caribbean, South America, Europe, and Asia. African Diaspora Archaeology is the study of how these Africans, despite being scattered and dispersed, were able to use their own cultural and spiritual traditions to (first) survive and then (over time and space) to create new identities in the new worlds they encountered. Archaeologists study the actual objects that people used, and the places in the ground where they left them (intentionally and unintentionally). Because of this, archaeology can shed new light on the ways that Africans and African Americans used spiritual beliefs to survive the cruelties of enslavement and its aftermath, the tenant farming/sharecropping system. Dr. McDavid will discuss this with examples from archaeological sites in South Texas and elsewhere across the country.

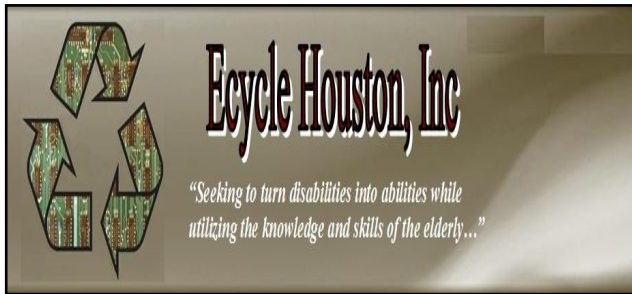
UPCOMING EVENTS YOU WILL WANT TO REMEMBER
